

Established in 2010, the Foundation Institute is committed to delivering excellence through its General Foundation Program which is a mandatory requirement for all students. It has been designed to adhere to national criteria mandated by the Oman Authority for Academic Accreditation and Quality Assurance of Education outlined in the Oman Academic Standards for General Foundation Programs. The institute aims to equip students with the necessary skills and knowledge for their tertiary education, serving as a transitional year before they commence their respective academic degree programs. The FI focuses on three main goals:

- Implementing a curriculum that meets national and international standards to ensure academic excellence.
- 2. Employing highly qualified instructors to provide expert guidance and instruction.
- 3. Offering robust support services to enhance student learning and personal development.

#### **Vision**

The Foundation Institute aspires to become an international model of excellence for foundation programs.

#### **Mission**

The Foundation Institute will deliver high-quality, dynamic, outcome-based courses and learning experiences that achieve improvement in learners' skills and knowledge in the English language, Mathematics, Digital Literacy, and Life and Study Skills to enable learners to function successfully in higher education and enrich their lives.

- To develop students' knowledge in Mathematics, Digital Literacy, and Life and Study Skills, ensuring their success in academic pursuits.
- To empower students to be independent, creative, innovative, and proficient in critical thinking and problem-solving.
- To inspire young people to value the culture and civilization of Omani society, fostering a love of work, celebration of achievement, and dedication to serving their country.
- To enhance and deliver a program that integrates the institute into the local and wider community, providing community services.
- To maintain internationally benchmarked standards for educational programs and assessments.
- To ensure high-quality professional development for instructors and administrative staff.
- To promote and enhance the academic reputation of the institute and the University of Nizwa, both locally and internationally.
- To continuously respond to students' academic needs by involving stakeholders transparently in decision-making processes.
- To develop an effective system of governance and management at the Foundation Institute, aligning with

the vision, mission, and core values and principles of the University of Nizwa and the Foundation Institute.

• To ensure the provision of high-quality services to all stakeholders.



#### The Placement Test

The Foundation Institute uses Linguaskill as its designated placement test. It is an Al-powered, adaptive, computer-based test of English proficiency developed by Cambridge University Press & Assessment and is widely used by educational institutions globally. It will assess your proficiency in three key language skills: Writing, Reading and Listening.

During the orientation period, before classes begin, the Foundation Institute administers Linguaskill to determine your English language proficiency level. Based on the results of the placement test, you will be allocated to an English course which corresponds to your language proficiency.

It is very important to take the placement test seriously to ensure you are placed in a level that best suits your abilities and maximizes your learning experience. If a student is placed in a level that is too challenging, they are unlikely to cope with the instruction and may struggle to meet the requirements. If a student is placed in a level that is too easy, they will likely become bored and not benefit from instruction.

Please note that the Foundation Institute operates solely based on placement test results. Students will not be moved up or down a level after being placed.

No placement tests are administered for Mathematics, Digital Literacy, or Life and Study Skills courses. It is mandatory for all students to complete these courses, and they will be automatically enrolled in each course during your foundation year.

## Course Equivalency for Previous Foundation Studies

If you have previously studied at the University of Nizwa's Foundation Institute or completed a General Foundation Program at another institute in Oman, you may be eligible to transfer your completed courses (English, Mathematics, Digital Literacy, and Life and Study Skills) as equivalents to our foundation program. To apply for this, visit the Foundation Institute with your official and original academic transcript and course descriptions before enrolling.

Please note that requests for course equivalency will not be accepted after the academic year begins.

## Exemption

Students who join the University of Nizwa with a TOEFL score of  $\geq$ 500 or IELTS  $\geq$ 5.0 (with none of the four areas less than 4.5) will be exempted from the English Language Program and may directly join the academic program. Please note that requests for exemption will not be accepted after the academic year begins.

## General Foundation Program Duration

The duration of the foundation program depends on the level of and the passing or failing of foundation courses. Please note that scholarship holders are only permitted one academic year to complete their foundation studies. If you are a scholarship student and fail to complete the General Foundation Program within one academic year, your scholarship may be frozen by the ministry, and you will be responsible for covering the financial costs until you complete the program. See Appendix C (Foundation Institute Progression/Flow Chart).

## Preparing for the Start of Classes and Approving Your Timetable

When teaching at the university begins, students are expected to have finalized their accommodation and transportation arrangements. You must ensure that you approve your timetable on Eduwave on the first day. Instructors will only allow students into the classrooms once students approve their timetables. Failing to approve your timetable on the first day will result in your being marked absent and missing parts of your courses. You will be barred from the final exam if you do not approve your timetable on time and will have to repeat the course. For scholarship students, this may result in the Ministry of Higher Education, Research, and Innovation to freeze your scholarships.

From the first day, you are expected to:

- Arrive to your classrooms 5 minutes before the start of class.
- Bring your notebook and stationery.
- Bring your calculator for mathematics courses.

Your teacher will present you with a **Teaching & Assessment Plan**, outlining the course requirements, assessment methods, advising and attendance policies, weekly schedule, and their office hours. It is important to know your teachers' names and office locations. Make sure to use their office hours to get help with anything you do not understand or need assistance with, as your instructors act as your academic advisors.



## The General Foundation Program

Students at the Foundation Institute must study English, Mathematics, Digital Literacy, and Life and Study Skills to prepare them for their higher academic studies. Study skills are also taught as an integral part of each course. The four components of the General Foundation Program as required by the Oman Academic Standards for General Foundation Programs are as follows:

English courses fall within the scope of the English Language Program (ELP), while all other courses fall within the scope of the Special Programs (SP).

## Registration and Course Structure

You will be automatically registered in your General Foundation Program courses by the Foundation Institute. You are not allowed to change your timetable or move from one course section to another, except in extremely rare cases for serious reasons. To request a change, you must seek formal approval from the Director of the Foundation Institute.

You must complete all General Foundation Program courses before progressing to your major program. Additionally, you are not permitted to register for any university course requirements or elective courses until you have completed all your courses at the Foundation Institute.

The English Language Program courses run on a cycle system (8 weeks), while Special Programs courses follow a semester system (16 weeks).

## English Language Program

The English Language Program follows an outcome-based curriculum aligned with the Oman Academic Standards for General Foundation Programs. It focuses on specific learning outcomes for Listening, Speaking, Reading and Writing. The Foundation Institute uses an integrated approach to mimic the natural way languages are acquired. English Language Program courses aim to improve your English language proficiency, preparing you to join your academic degree program, most of which are taught in English.

## **English Language Program**

The English Language program offers four non-credit courses. Based on your placement test results, you will be placed in a course that matches your English language proficiency: Elementary (FENG001/Level 1), Pre-Intermediate (FENG002/Level 2), Intermediate (FENG003/Level 3), or Upper-Intermediate (FENG004/Level 4). The following table shows the thresholds applied for placement:

#### **English Language Program Progression**

#### Duration

- Each English Language Program course lasts 8 weeks (1 cycle).
- If you repeat a course, the course duration does not change.
- The duration of the Foundation period depends on the level of entry and the passing or failing of subsequent levels.
- Regardless of your entry level, you must successfully complete Level 4 and all Special Programs courses
   before you progress to your academic degree program.

## On Passing

 Unless you are exempt from the General Foundation Program, you must study up to and pass Level 4 and all Special Program courses before you can go to your academic studies.

#### On Failing

- Repeat courses are offered to students who fail a level.
- If you fail a level, you must repeat it the following cycle.

#### Assessment

- Each English Language Program course consists of learning followed by assessments.
- To move to the next level or exit the English Language Program, you must score 70% of the total weightings
  of continuous plus final exam assessment in the English Language Program.

#### **English Language Program Outcomes**

By the end of the English Language Program, you are expected to:

- Actively participate in a discussion on a topic relevant to your studies by asking questions, agreeing and disagreeing, asking for clarification, sharing information, expressing and asking options.
- Paraphrase information (orally or in writing) from a written or spoken text or from graphically presented data.
- Prepare and deliver a talk of at least 5 minutes. Use library resources in preparing the talk, speak clearly and confidently, make eye contact and use body language to support the delivery of ideas. Respond confidently to questions.
- Write texts of a minimum of 350 words, showing control of layout, organization, punctuation, spelling, sentence structure, grammar, and vocabulary.
- Produce a written report of a minimum of 500 words showing evidence of research, note-taking, review and revision of work, paraphrasing, summarizing, use of quotations and use of reference.
- Take notes and respond to questions about the topic, main ideas, details and opinions or arguments from an
  extended listening text (e.g. lecture, news broadcast).
- Follow spoken instructions in order to carry out a task with a number of stages.
- Listen to a conversation between two or more speakers and be able to answer questions in relation to context, relationship between speakers, register (e.g. formal or informal)
- Read a one-to-two-page text and identify the main idea(s) and extract specific information in a given period
  of time.

• Read an extensive text broadly relevant to the area of your study (minimum three pages) and respond to questions that require analytical skills, e.g. predication, deduction, inference.



## Special Programs

The Special Programs also follow an outcome-based curriculum aligned with the Oman Academic Standards for General Foundation Programs. The non-credit courses offered in Special Programs include Mathematics Basic with Applied or Mathematics Basic with Pure, Digital Literacy, and Life and Study Skills. You must complete these courses before starting your academic program.

#### Mathematics Basic with Applied

The Mathematics Basic with Applied (MATH-BA) course is designed to provide a smooth transition from secondary mathematics taught in Arabic to mathematics taught in English. This course is intended for students pursing higher studies in Arts, Linguistic Studies, Social Sciences, Education (History, Geography, Religious Studies, etc.), and similar fields.

The course covers basic arithmetic, algebraic, geometrical, and trigonometric concepts. It aims to help students think analytically and improve their problem-solving skills. By the end of the course, students will be able to comprehend and apply general mathematical principles and statistical concepts to various real-life problems.

#### Mathematics Basic with Applied Outcomes

By the end of this course, students are expected to:

- Describe terms related to the real number system and basic algebra and perform arithmetic operations on polynomials and numbers.
- Solve problems involving equations and inequalities such as linear, quadratic and fractional, using appropri-

- ate properties and techniques.
- Apply the theoretical concepts of algebra, trigonometry, and analytical geometry while solving a variety of problems.
- Analyze basic geometrical concepts using a coordinate plane and apply these concepts to solve analytical geometry problems.
- Construct mathematical models of real-life problems using equations and right-angle trigonometry and slove them.
- Solve systems of linear equations and inequalities in two variables algebraically and graphically.
- Demonstrate an understanding of functions, sketching their graphs, and evaluating the maximum and minimum values of different functions.
- Understand the exponential and logarithmic functions and their inverse relationship and apply these ideas
  to solve different real-life problems such as the evaluation of compound interests.
- Use a graphing calculator to analyze and interpret equations and graphs.
- Understand basic concepts of descriptive statistics and probability of events.

#### Mathematics Basic with Pure

The Mathematics Basic with Pure (MATH-BP) course is designed to provide a smooth transition from secondary mathematics taught in Arabic to mathematics taught in English. This course is intended for students pursing higher studies in Engineering, Sciences, Pharmacy and Nursing, Education (Science and Mathematics etc.), and similar fields.

The course covers basic arithmetic, algebraic, geometrical, and trigonometric concepts. It aims to help students think analytically and improve their problem-solving skills. It helps students acquire a deeper understanding of different mathematical functions. The course emphasizes abstract thinking and uses a traditional approach to learning while incorporating technology as a tool to enhance understanding.

#### Mathematics Basic with Pure Outcomes

By the end of this course, students are expected to:

- Describe terms related to the real number system and basic algebra and perform arithmetic operations on polynomials and numbers.
- Solve problems involving equations and inequalities such as linear, quadratic and fractional, using appropriate properties and techniques.
- Apply the theoretical concepts of algebra, trigonometry, and analytical geometry while solving a variety of problems.
- Analyze basic geometrical concepts using a coordinate plane and apply these concepts to solve analytical

geometry problems.

- Construct mathematical models of real-life problems using equations and right-angle trigonometry and solve them.
- Understand the definition of a function, sketch the graphs of functions and evaluate extremum values of different functions.
- Describe exponential and logarithmic functions and apply the inverse relationship between these two to solve a variety of problems.
- Demonstrate an understanding of different trigonometric identities and apply the law of Sines and Cosines to solve triangles.
- Use a graphing software to sketch, analyze and interpret equations and graphs of functions.
- Understand basic concepts of descriptive statistics and the probability of simple events.

#### **Digital Literacy**

The Digital Literacy (DL) course is designed to provide you with the opportunity to learn a wide range of both theoretical and practical computer skills, which will enable you to make use of computer systems during your undergraduate program and your career after graduation. Apart from direct computing skills, the course will encourage self-learning techniques and prepare you for the acquisition of the American version of Internet and Computing Core Certificate (IC3).

### **Digital Literacy Outcomes**

By the end of this course, you are expected to:

- Discuss fundamentals of computer and the hardware used to operate it.
- Describe different types of software and practice most used operating systems and their capabilities.
- Recognize network fundamentals and the efficient use of the Internet.
- Apply various types of electronic and digital communication and collaboration computer systems effectively.
- Demonstrate good skills in keyboarding, using Microsoft Office Word, Excel and PowerPoint.

#### Life and Study Skills

The Life and Study Skills (ULLS) course is designed to equip you with essential university and social skills needed for a successful academic and professional life. You will learn about the fundamental differences between school life and university life, the importance of discipline in university life, and how to benefit from modern technology. The course will also teach you necessary classroom skills, such as note-taking, and emphasize the importance of time management and scheduling to make the best use of your time. Additionally, you will gain a good understanding of study techniques and exam preparation strategies. The course will also equip you with the skills needed to write research reports adhering to scientific research standards and academic integrity, which are essential for a successful academic life. You will also be encouraged to strive for personal and familial excellence, respect for others, and the promotion of Islamic and human values. You will be motivated to achieve

success by learning the foundations of success, problem-solving, and decision-making skills to handle challenges you may face in your academic journey.

#### Life and Study Skills Outcomes

By the end of this course, you are expected to:

- Understand the fundamental differences between school and university environments.
- Develop essential university study skills using modern technology.
- Acquire presentation skills and note-taking abilities in classroom settings.
- Recognize the importance of time management and prioritize tasks to manage personal and academic life
  efficiently.
- Gain the required strategies and skills for preparing and studying for tests in an organized way.
- Practice methods and strategies for writing a mini research report.
- Understand and apply the principles of academic integrity through writing a research report.
- Distinguish between forms of human affiliation and their importance, understand the concept of citizenship
  and its significance, to uphold Islamic and Omani values within and outside the university.
- Discuss the foundations of success to achieve a successful and distinguished personality in society.
- Learn how to analyse problems, solve them, and make appropriate and correct decisions.

#### **Special Programs Progression**

#### Duration

- Each Special Programs course lasts 16 weeks (1 semester).
- If you repeat a course, the course duration does not change.
- The duration of the Foundation period depends on the level of entry and the passing or failing of subsequent levels.
- Regardless of your entry level, you must successfully complete Level 4 and all Special Programs courses before you progress to your academic degree program.

### On Passing

 Unless you are exempt from the General Foundation Program, you must study up to and pass Level 4 and all Special Program courses before you can go to your academic studies.

### On Failing

- Repeat courses are offered to students who fail Special Program courses.
- If you fail a Special Programs course, you must repeat it the following semester.

#### Assessment

- Each Special Programs course consists of learning followed by assessments.
- To complete the Special Programs courses, you must score 60% of the total weightings of continuous plus final exam assessment.

#### Results Announcement

Your exam results for all General Foundation Program courses are posted at the end of each cycle for the English Language Program and each semester for the Special Programs on EduWave.

### Appeal Policy

If you have concerns regarding your exam results, you can submit an electronic appeal. Please note the following quidelines:

- Appeal Period: The appeal period is limited to two days.
- Submission Method: All appeals must be submitted electronically via this link: https://portal.unizwa.edu.om/gradeappeal. Appeals submitted through any other means will not be accepted or considered.

To submit an appeal, you need to provide the following information:

- 1. Course name (select from the available list)
- 2. Section number (select from the available list)
- 3. Instructor's name (select from the available list)
- 4. Reason for appeal (must be written in English only)

#### Important Notes:

- Ensure you select the correct instructor for the course. The same applies to Special Programs courses.
- Appeals will not be considered if the wrong instructor is selected.
- Appeals will not be accepted after the specified period.

Once you submit your appeal, the Appeals Committee will review your final exam and assignment grades. Based on their review, they will either:

- Adjust the grade on EduWave if an error in grade calculation is found.
- Maintain the original grade if no error is detected.

### Results Withholding

Your results may be withheld in the following cases:

- Incomplete instructor and course evaluation form.
- Late payment of tuition fees.
- Outstanding fines or overdue library books.

### Classroom Behaviour

### Mobile Phone Policy

You are not allowed to use your mobile phone in class. Taking unauthorized videos or audio recordings in class or on campus of fellow students and instructors is a violation. Uploading such recordings on social media is also a violation and will be subject to disciplinary action.

### Student Attendance and Excused Absence Policy

### **Attendance Recording**

The Foundation Institute understands that certain circumstances may be beyond your control, but we also emphasize that you must attend all class sessions and related activities for your registered courses. Students must sign an attendance sheet in class, which the teacher then records on EduWave, which is updated daily. The Foundation Institute has a statutory obligation to accurately record student attendance in all classes and lectures, in line with the University of Nizwa's pastoral care and health and safety commitments.

### **Absenteeism and Warning Notices**

Eduwave automatically issues warning notices based your attendance. Notifications are sent to you, your guardian, instructor, Deanship of Records and Registration, and Deanship of Student Affairs and Society Services. Warning notices are issued at the following thresholds:

- 5% of contact hours missed (Warning 1)
- 10% of contact hours missed (Warning 2)
- 15% of contact hours missed (Warning 3)
- "Barred from Exam" notice at 25% of contact hours missed, where you will not be allowed to sit for your final exam (Warning 4).

The attendance policy is also outlined in the Teaching and Assessment Plan (T&A Plan).

#### **Excused Absences**

You must apply for an excused absence, where you are required to present an original, authentic document as proof. Excused absences requiring supporting documentation are classified below:

#### **Important Notes:**

- Sick leave must be verified by a healthcare institution and clearly state the nature of the illness and the period needed for recuperation.
- Sick leaves issued by private clinics must be stamped by the nearest health centre or the regional Directorate of Health.
- Hospital attendance certificates from either government or private hospitals are classified as non-medical excuses and are approved through the Centre for Social Welfare.
- All excuses must be submitted through the portal link provided above. No excuses submitted via email will be accepted or considered.
- Any falsification of documents will be dealt with in accordance with the University's disciplinary rules and regulations.

#### **Impact of Absence on Academic Performance**

Students must understand that continued absences will negatively affect their academic performance. Regular attendance is crucial for staying on track with coursework and achieving academic success. Missing classes not only hinders your understanding of the material but also means you will need to catch up on work while managing an already tight schedule. This can lead to increased stress and further academic challenges. Therefore, it is essential to attend all classes regularly to ensure you stay on top of your studies and maintain good academic standing.

### Student Advising Policy

The Foundation Institute understands that joining university can present significant challenges such as living away from home, learning in an English-language environment, experiencing co-education for the first time, and interacting with instructors from around the world. The Foundation Institute is committed to providing support and resolutions through the Student and Academic Advising Team. This team consists of:

- Your instructor/s: The first point of contact for expressing academic or non-academic concerns.
- The Foundation Institute Student and Academic Advising Officer (Dr. Salama Al-Ruqaishi): Available to
  assist you with issues that cannot be resolved by your instructors.

### Open Door Policy

The Foundation Institute has an open-door policy, and the administration welcomes students to visit with any concerns. Students are encouraged to:

- Use the "Suggestion Box" at the institute to leave anonymous feedback.
- Email the administration with any concerns or suggestions.
- Visit the Student and Academic Advising Officer.

#### ANJIZ

ANJIZ is located on the second floor in Building 2. It is an academic resource facility available to General Foundation Program students through the Student Success System (SSS). ANJIZ provides various activities and services designed to enhance students' skills in all courses offered through the English Language Program and Special Programs. Additionally, it supports the development of essential life skills such as self-study, research, and self-reliance

### **Services Offered by ANJIZ**

- Academic Counselling: Foundation Institute instructors offer academic counselling as extra support outside
  the classroom. This service helps students meet their academic needs in the General Foundation Program.
- 2. **Peer-Tutorial Sessions:** Provided by the Student Support Fund, these sessions assist struggling students in meeting the program's academic standards.
- 3. Extra-Curricular Activities: Designed to enhance students' performance in all course areas, these activities include discussions, debates, games, and web-based exercises conducted by Foundation Institute instructors and peer tutors.
- **4. Computers:** Available for student use, these computers facilitate scientific research and provide access to useful websites and educational software. These resources encourage students to practice their academic skills in their free time.
- **5. Miscellaneous English Stories and Textbooks:** A variety of reading materials are available to help students broaden their knowledge across different academic fields. These resources support the development of critical thinking and research skills, particularly for projects.

These resources and services are designed to support and enhance your learning experience, helping your success in the General Foundation Program and beyond.

### Main Library

The Main Library at the University of Nizwa is located in Building 21. It consists of three large halls. To accommodate the diverse needs of students, the library provides separate study facilities for male and female students, along with study tables suitable for individual studying and larger study groups. It has a wide range of resources including books, journals, and digital materials, to support your studies. It provides a quiet study environment, computer access, and knowledgeable staff to assist with research and information needs. Use the library to enhance your learning research capabilities.

### **Main Library Facilities and Resources**

- **Reference Collections:** Comprehensive resources for in-depth research.
- **General Circulating Collections:** Books and materials available for loan.
- Reference Desk: Assistance with research and findings resources.
- OPACs (Online Public Access Catalogue): Search for library resources.
- Self-Check-Out Station: Convenient self-service for borrowing books.
- **Photocopiers:** Available for copying materials.
- **Computers:** Twelve computers in the Central Hall provide access to all electronic resources available in the databases, e-books, and online journals.

#### **Main Library Services**

The library serves faculty, staff, students, researchers, and outside users, offering a wide range of resources to support academic and research activities. On business days, the library is open from 08:00–20:00. On weekends, the opening hours are between 08:00–15:00. Please note that library hours change during the Summer semester.

### Student Groups

### Dining Options

Modern cafeterias for both male and female students are available on-campus, serving a variety of meals at reasonable prices. These cafeterias provide sandwiches, hot meals for lunch and dinner, and remain open until the evening. The local authority conducts direct inspections to ensure food safety and hygiene. There are also various cafes across campus. The female cafeteria can be located in Building 18 and the male cafeteria in Building 19.

### Supermarket

A supermarket on-campus provides students with access to different necessities. The supermarket is open until the evening, ensuring students can conveniently purchase essential items. The supermarket is located in Building 31.

## Housing Options

You can have access to dormitories on or off-campus. The university has 45 separate student residences, with dedicated facilities for male and female students. Each residence includes a meeting room, a large kitchen, a multipurpose activity room, a TV room, a study hall, and laundry areas. The dormitories are supervised around

the clock by qualified staff to ensure a quiet and orderly environment. The university also provides transportation for students in the housing complex to go shopping three times a week.





### Managing Your Financial Resources and Paying Tuition

Understanding the financial requirements for the General Foundation Program is essential. Tuition fees cover all courses, including English Language Program courses, Digital Literacy, Mathematics, and Life and Study Skills. \*For the first cycle, hostel insurance fees must be paid in advance, along with the semester costs (OMR 260 or OMR 300 or OMR 180). Subsequent payments can be made before the end of each cycle.


