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

THE SEMINAR

Organized by the University of Bahrain's Centre of French Studies, the seminar's title was

Didactique du FLE dans les universités du Golfe arabique

In English: 'Teaching of French as a foreign language in the Gulf countries'



The two-day program included three different panels of research papers, centered on

- 1- The teaching and learning of French in the GCC
- 2- Reflections on didactics in an academic context
- 3- The use of Digital Technology in Teaching French



There were around fifteen participants coming from France, Koweit, Oman and Bahrain.

The French Embassy in Bahrain was also involved. Not only they sponsored the event but the Ambassador, H.E. Cécile Longé and the Cultural attaché Mr Dominique Chastres, delivered a speech along with Dr Sara Bader, the director of the Center for French Studies.

The French Embassy provided also one of the keynote speakers, inviting Dr Dolly Ramella from University Rennes 2.

Altogether, it was a rich opportunity to meet with colleagues around the Gulf region, and an inspiring possibility to measure the vivid variety of French and Francophone studies in the GCCC.



THE PAPERS DELIVERED BY THE FRENCH SECTION

The members of the UoN French section delivered a wide variety of papers, covering a large arrays of perspectives in teaching and learning French. The titles of the papers delivered, as shown in the program:

Dr Guillaume Thouroude: "Enseigner la littérature française dans les pays du Golfe: exemple de la pratique théâtrale à l'université de Nizwa" (Teaching French literature in the Gulf: Example of theatrical practices at the University of Nizwa).



Mr Ali Manoubi: "Grammaire contrastive et didactique du FLE: l'ordre des mots" (Contrastive grammar and teaching of French as a Foreign Language: Word order).



Dr Cécile Gabarre: "Recettes de classe et classe de cuisine : projet de blog interculturel pour aborder l'expression créative avec de grands débutants" (Class recipes and cooking class: An intercultural blog project).



Dr Serge Gabarre: "Le téléphone portable est-il une solution pour l'oral en grand groupe?" (Are mobile phones an answer to teaching oral skills in a large group?).
